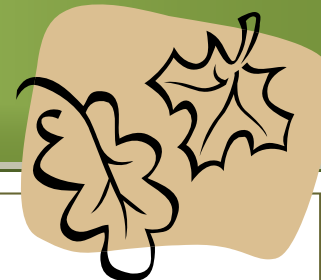

## ASCLS House of Delegates – Report from Atlanta

I attended the ASCLS Annual Meeting in Atlanta as a delegate from ASCLS-WA. Delegates vote to elect the next year's ASCLS officers and participate in the House of Delegates (HOD) which is similar to the House of Representatives where each state sends delegates based on the number of ASCLS members in their state. In addition, the state President, President Elect, Student Representative, and First Year Professional are also delegates. Of the total possible number of ASCLS delegates (308), 232 were credentialed and 214 were seated in the House of Delegates.

The HOD begins with a report from the ASCLS President on accomplishments for the year. These are a few of the highlights. As you probably know, ASCLS provides quality continuing education and a peer-reviewed journal (now electronic). In-person meetings at local, state, regional, and national levels allow members to network, form friendships, and discuss issues in depth; often with more meaningful outcomes than teleconferences and emails alone. The Leadership Academy increased the number of professional development opportunities and graduates have been very successful in taking on new roles in ASCLS. Consumer advocacy has been enhanced with Lab Tests On-Line which each day answers many consumer (patient) inquiries about their lab test results.

There were two issues to be discussed at this year's HOD. The first was a new definition of diversity. This evolved from the original Black Caucus which later became the Forum for the Concerns of Minorities. A task force was assigned last year to define diversity as it pertains to the membership of ASCLS and suggest ways to promote all types of diversity within ASCLS.

The proposed definition is:

*“ASCLS is an inclusive, culturally relevant community of people acknowledging their differences and unique characteristics; it is an organization where all persons can engage and participate in a meaningful way empowering everyone to grow and learn.”*

Although there was an objection to some of the wording, the proposed definition as originally written was adopted by the HOD.

The second issue was approval of the Patient Safety position paper. Position papers state ASCLS' official position so members, non-members, and other organizations will know where ASCLS stands. In this case, the position paper outlines patient safety competencies, states the need to teach patient safety in educational programs, and emphasizes the importance of including patient safety in certification and licensure exams. The discussion centered around the terms Clinical Laboratory Science (the profession) and Medical Laboratory Scientist (the certification). Once that distinction was made, the only revision proposed was to define medical laboratory professionals as MLS, MLT, phlebotomists, clinical lab assistants, and DCLS (Doctorate in Clinical Laboratory Science) and use the term “medical laboratory professionals” instead of only MLS and MLT. This revision was approved by the HOD.

The Patient Safety position paper was approved by the HOD.

The new ASCLS officers were installed and the new president, Barbara Snyderman, gave her acceptance speech. Her themes are communication, involvement, and accountability.

The Mendelson Award was presented to Shawna Anderson for organizing the revision of the Body of

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Knowledge; Kathy Wesler for running the very successful E & R Silent Auction for 21 years; and Susie Zanto for serving as ASCLS President.

It was then time for commendations, a time for anyone who wishes, to recognize and thank the people who help make ASCLS the strong organization it is today. For example, in our region, Cathy Otto was thanked for leading the Patient Safety Committee for several years and she was welcomed back to Region IX as she had recently moved from Maryland. Judging by the number of commendations, ASCLS has very talented and

dedicated members who volunteer countless hours to their profession and their professional organization.

The ASCLS Annual Meeting is a time to attend outstanding scientific sessions, meet new friends and reconnect with long-time friends, and be part of the governance of the organization. It's exciting and energizing. I encourage any of you to become involved with ASCLS and become a delegate next year. The Annual Meeting will be in Philadelphia, another great city to explore!

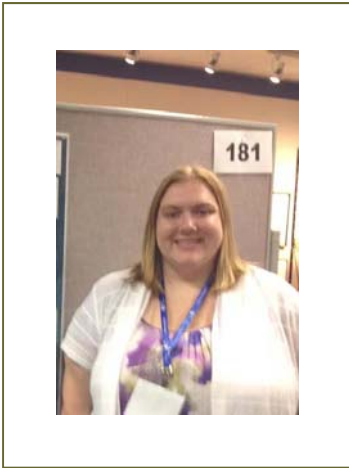

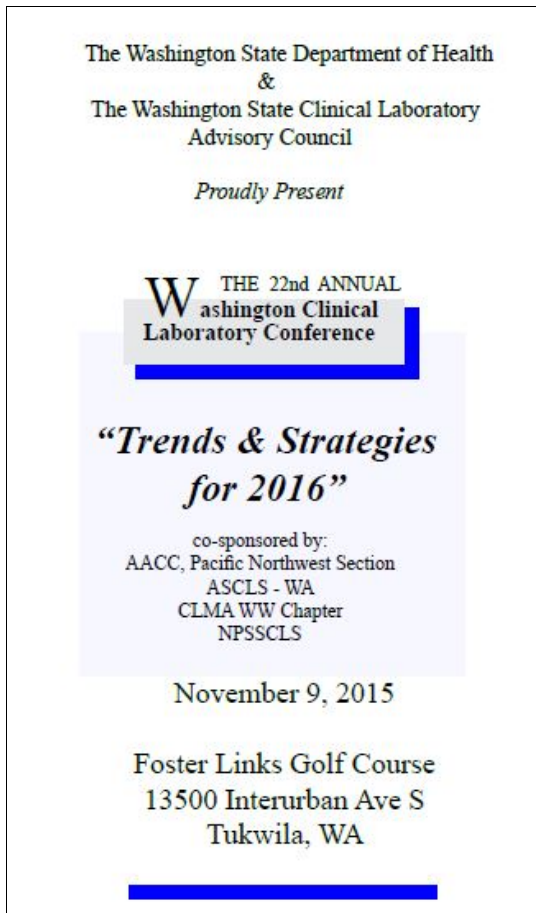
